Formation Session is Scheduled: The Director of the Office of Liturgy of the Diocese of Saginaw will be here on February 6th at 6

pm to conduct a formation session for all those wishing to help distribute the Eucharist during Mass. In the past, we called such volunteers "Eucharistic Ministers." But the actual term is "Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion." The session will last roughly an hour and a half. Anyone wanting to be part of this ministry must attend this session and must be a "fully-



initiated" Catholic. That is, they must have received Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion. One week later, on Feb. 13th, I will meet in church at 6 pm to go over all the specific details of how to perform this ministry at our parish. Consequently, there will not be Mass or adoration on either Feb. 6th or the 13th.

Confirming 2nd-Graders: Last week I wrote how this year the regional Vicars will be conferring the Sacrament of Confirmation on children in their Vicariates who are preparing for First Communion. That means, as Vicar, I'll be travelling to parishes in our Vicariate. But people sometimes ask me why children are receiving Confirmation so young. Some background may help.

In the early Church, whenever people became Christian they were baptized at the Easter Vigil by the Bishop. It was the Bishop who anointed the newly-baptized with Chrism to "seal" in the Holy Spirit given to them at Baptism. As the Church continued to grow, so did the number of Easter Vigil liturgies, and the Bishop could not be present at all of them. And infants began being baptized as well. In the East, it was decided that that whoever administered

Baptism could also confirm. But in the West, the decision was made to reserve the anointing of Confirmation to the Bishop. As a result, Catholics were confirmed whenever the Bishop was able to reach their parish, sometimes a year later, and sometimes several years later. Because Confirmation was delayed, First Communion was delayed, sometimes for a dozen years or more.

In 1910 the Pope decided that Catholics shouldn't be waiting so long to receive the Eucharist, so he lowered the age for First Communion to about 7 or 8 years old. With that decision, the original order of the Sacraments was changed. Baptism still came first, then came First Reconciliation, then First Communion, then Confirmation. With that change came an unfortunate change in how Confirmation was understood. It was no longer seen as a Sacrament that sealed in the Spirit given at Baptism, but as a "you're-now-a-full-member-of-the-Church" Sacrament. But that is not our doctrine. Receiving Confirmation does not show that someone is a full member of the Church. Receiving the *Eucharist* shows that someone is a full member of the Church.

Some bishops have instructed parishes to put Confirmation back in its original location: after Baptism but before First Communion. In 1990 the parishes of the Diocese of Saginaw were given ten years to do this. But it varies by diocese. I'll be posting all the Confirmation dates soon, because there won't be daily Mass on those days.

Daily Mass Change: Remember that there is no longer daily Mass on Fridays.
