

The Next Bishop of the Diocese of Saginaw... is Bishop Robert D. Gruss. Bishop Gruss was born in 1955 in

Texarcana, Arkansas. Before entering the seminary he was a corporate pilot and a flight instructor. He was ordained a priest in 1994 and served as both the Chancellor and Vocations Director of the Diocese of Davenport, Iowa. He also served as the Vice-Rector of the Pontifical North American College in Rome. In 2011 he was appointed Bishop of the Diocese of Rapid City in South Dakota. He likes to hunt and fish and owns a Harley motorcycle. He said he's looking forward to exploring the state of Michigan on his motorcycle. He also likes riding horses.

Bishop Gruss will be officially installed as the Bishop of Saginaw on Friday July 26th. The installation will take place at a very special Mass. The Apostolic letter (the official letter from Rome appointing him as our new Bishop) is read out loud (usually by the Pope's official representative) and then the letter is shown to the college of consultors (a group of experienced priests in the Diocese who advise the Bishop). The new Bishop is then seated in the Bishop's chair (called the cathedra) and is handed the crozier (the Bishop's staff). At this point it is common for those gathered to applaud. The new Bishop then rises and is welcomed by various representatives of the Diocese, both clergy and laity. Other religious leaders in Saginaw, as well as civic leaders, often greet the new Bishop at this time. When the greeting of the new Bishop is completed, the Mass of Installation continues with the singing of the Gloria. This will be a major event, with standing-room-only crowds, with bishops present from all over Michigan, as well as visiting clergy from the Diocese of Rapid City and members of Bishop Gruss' family. The Installation Mass might be shown on television, but it will certainly be shown online at the Diocesan website www.saginaw.org. Until July 26th, Bishop Walter Hurley will continue to administrate our Diocese, so at Mass we'll continue to pray for "Francis our Pope and Walter our Apostolic Administrator." More information will follow.



The Feast of the Ascension: In 1998 many U.S. bishops of "ecclesiastical provinces" (an archdiocese and the other dioceses that historically go with it) petitioned the Vatican to move the Feast of the Ascension to the Sunday right before Pentecost. (Other feasts had already been moved to Sundays, such as Epiphany and The Body and Blood of Christ.) The Vatican granted the request. These days only the provinces of Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, Philadelphia, and Omaha continue to celebrate the Ascension on Thursday.



Parish Position Available: Need a part-time job? Are you good with repairs and fixing things? Our parish needs a part-time maintenance person. The position requires less than 20 hours a week, and you would not have to mow the grass (we've hired a lawn-care company for that). Basic knowledge of wiring, plumbing, and the tools used in those areas is highly preferable, as well as basic carpentry skills and the knowledge of how to use power tools. Applicants would need to be able to climb ladders, carry heavy objects, work in cramped spaces, and be able to work flexible hours year-round indoors and outdoors, including weekends when necessary. In the winter, we've hired a snow removal service for the wide sidewalks and the parking spaces and driveways, but the maintenance person would have to keep all church/rectory entrances and steps shoveled and salted. You would need a valid driver's license and be able to perform all assigned tasks without a lot of supervision. The position offers fifteen dollars an hour, and the complete job description is available on the shelf in both church vestibules.
